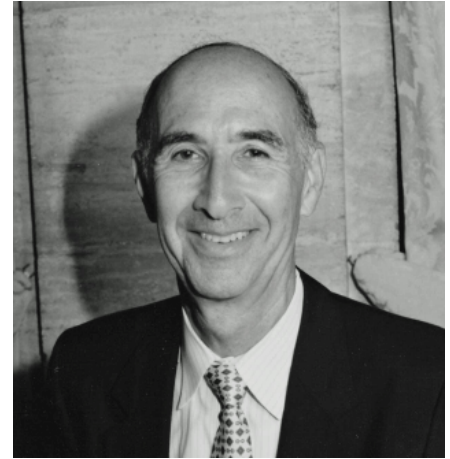


**Obituary of Manuel Harold Sloane (Deceased 4/22/2010)
(Devoted husband, father and Osteopathic physician)**

Dr. Manuel H. Sloane (Manny) was born in Philadelphia, PA on October 5, 1924 to immigrant parents, Adolf and Bessie Slabotnick. He came from humble beginnings: his father was a tool and metal worker at the Naval Shipyard, and his mother was a seamstress. He attended Drexel University in 1942 prior to enlisting in the Army Air Force. During World War II, Dr. Sloane was a B17 and B24 navigator over Britain, France, and Germany. After the war he graduated from Temple University in 1947 and then from Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1952. He was married in 1952 to Beatrice Seenofsky. In 1953, Dr. Sloane and his wife moved to Detroit for his radiology residency. After his residency he had private radiology practices for 5 years in Detroit, New Jersey and Philadelphia.



Dr. Sloane was a founding member of Tri-County Hospital in Springfield PA in 1960, and served on the Board of Directors for 10 years. He spent most of his 30 year career as the radiology department chair at Tri-County. During this time, his practice expanded as the field of radiology experienced major technological changes. Dr. Sloane introduced professional and departmental changes which included Electronic Medical Records, Cine-Radiology, Computer Aided Tomography (CAT Scanning), Interventional Radiology, Nuclear Medicine, Radiation Oncology, Radio-Immunoassays, Ultrasound Imaging, and other radiologic and medical advances.

Dr. Sloane was a life long learner, researcher and teacher. At the height of his career he stepped down as department chair to take on a Fellowship in Neuroradiology at the University of Texas and the M.D. Anderson and Herman hospitals in Houston. When he returned to Philadelphia he continued to practice radiological medicine at Tri-County and at other regional hospitals. From 1994 to 1999 when he retired, Dr. Sloane served in a teaching capacity at the University of Pennsylvania, Department of Nuclear Medicine. His four children followed in his academic footsteps: all completed master's degrees in their respective fields, two completed doctorates, and three of the four earned and maintain professional certifications.

Dr. Sloane served on the board of directors for the American Osteopathic Radiological College (AORC) from 1975-1980, and was its president in 1979. He was named Emeritus to the American Osteopathic Board of Radiology in 1994 after serving on the board for 9 years.

In addition to his career, Dr. Sloane enjoyed photography, traveling to Israel and many foreign destinations. He and his wife started a small philanthropic foundation to serve the needs of the community. Gifts included donations to the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, American Osteopathic Radiological College, The Jewish Federation, The Philadelphia Zoo, Doctors without Borders, Academy of Natural Sciences, Hadassah, The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Arthur Ashe Tennis, and Macula Vision Research, to name a few.

Dr. Sloane lived a full and remarkable life, and was well loved and respected. He is survived by his wife Beatrice and their children: Elliot & Jolena Sloane, Ylanah Sloane, Martin Sloane and Joel & Peggy Loevner-Sloane and 5 grandchildren: Mira, Daniel, Shanah, Adam and Laura Sloane.
